








# The Bay and its rivers are polluted by nutrients and sediment.









\* Clarity standards are set by U.S. EPA Chesapeake Bay Program based on the darkness of water, which reflects algae content and suspended solids.




### Nitrogen Pollution to the Chesapeake Bay

Sources by Sector

















Bay and its rivers are listed on the Clean Water Act (303 d) list of "impaired" or "dirty" waters because of nitrogen, phosphorus and sediment pollution.

A "TMDL" is required for waterbodies on this list.

#### 1972

Clean Water Act enacted. Pollution limits (or TMDLs) created to clean up impaired waters.

#### 1983

EPA and Bay jurisdictions signed the Chesapeake Bay Agreement recognizing the need to act to clean up the Bay.



1976

Congress directed EPA to study the Bay.

1987

Clean Water Act codified the Chesapeake Bay Program.

Bay Agreement set numerical reduction target (40% reduction by 2000).



1998

Chesapeake Bay on impaired waters list.

2000

Chesapeake 2000 Agreement to clean up the Bay by 2010.

1990

1995

The 1987 agreement was reaffirmed.



1999

Lawsuit results in pollution limits (or TMDLs) required by 2010.



**How We Got Here** 

#### 2003

EPA developed water quality criteria for dissolved oxygen and clarity for the Bay and the sediment and nutrient allocations to achieve them.

#### 2009

CBF filed a against EPA for failing to enforce the CWA.

#### 2012

States refine and improve their clean up plans - "Phase 2 WIPs"

#### 2004 - 2005

Bay Jurisdictions develop "Tributary Strategies" describing actions needed to achieve their share of the pollution allocations.

#### December 2010

EPA released pollution limits (or TMDLs) for the Chesapeake Bay region based on State WIPs – the "Cleanwater Blueprint".



Of the more than 40,000 TMDLs in the country, very few have been implemented.

- 1. Comprehensive and detailed state-specific plans
- 2. Deadlines (2017 and 2025)
- 3. Two-year incremental goals or "milestones"
- 4. Consequences for failure
